Trustee of the Trust Funds Report

At calendar 2022 year end, the total market value of Common Trust Funds and Capital Reserves under management was \$2,553,407. During 2022, in accordance with a warrant article approved by the voters, the Town contributed \$288,500 to its Capital Reserves. Similarly, Mascenic (SAU 87) contributed \$41,000 to its Capital Reserves.

The Town's two Landfill Capital Reserves were discontinued in 2022. As the law requires, all balances in these capital reserves were returned to the Town treasury. The balance returned from the Landfill Capital Reserve was \$35,874, and the balance returned from the Expendable Landfill Capital Reserve was \$50,852.

In 2022, there were several distributions from Town Capital Reserves. The largest distributions came from the Highway Department Expendable Capital Reserve and totaled \$234,309 (\$121,000 for a roadside mower and \$113,309 for two trucks).

The Trustees continue to use Three Bearings Fiduciary Advisors as their investment advisor. The annualized total returns (net of fees) on the Common Trust Funds and Capital Reserve Funds for periods ending December 31, 2022 appear in the following table.

Total returns were negative in 2022. This occurred mainly because rising interest rates caused both stock and bond prices to decline. However, longer-term annualized total returns remained positive. As the table indicates, three-year annualized total returns were modestly positive, while five-year annualized total returns were on the order of two percent.

The State of New Hampshire limits the level of risk that can be assumed when investing common trust funds and capital reserve funds. As always, the Trustees will continue to work with their investment manager to ensure that assets are prudently managed and that all State requirements are met.

In 2021 Jim Coffey was elected to complete the final year of the three-year term of a vacated Trustee position. In 2022 he was elected to a full three-year term.

The Trustees do not follow a fixed meeting schedule and meet on an as needed basis. However, our meetings are always posted, and the minutes of our meetings are available on the Town website.

Board of Assessors

For the calendar/fiscal year of 2022, taxable property increased by \$9,030,063.00. Each year we produce a Summary Inventory of Valuation (MS-1) which is sent to the NH Department of Revenue Administration for setting the property Tax. A summary is included on the following page. We have also added a printout summary of all Town owned property.

During the past year 213 Deeds were filed with the registry of deeds. The highest sale on the list was \$750,000.00. The assessing software is updated daily when deeds, easements and plans are submitted from the registry of deeds.

During the past year we processed 7 abatements, 1 disability exemption, 1 veterans total disability tax credit, 9 Veterans tax credit, 1 elderly exemptions, 3 solar exemption, 7 intents to cut wood or timber, 3 intent to excavate, , 3 excavation tax warrant,

GIS mapping system is online at the town website <u>townofnewipwich.org</u> and parcels are linked to assessing data. Other layers are also on line. This will be helpful to the citizens of this town, various town boards, Engineers and others.

We encourage property owners to look at the Assessors page on the town web site. We occasionally find taxpayers that have not taken advantage of tax credits or exemptions. In one recent case we found a taxpayer that has gone many years without filing for the Veteran's Tax Credit. Please bring to us any questions you have. Often an in person meeting can resolve misunderstandings.

We want to acknowledge the dedicated help we get from our Administrative Assistant, Jennifer Minckler and other members of the Town Office.

Board of Selectmen

2022 A year of continued challenges and change. Over the last year, the Covid-19 virus and the challenges presented by it continued to impact and re shape our social and political landscapes. The BOS was and will remain ever vigilant in pushing back at the attacks on our individual freedoms. We continued to follow State and Federal guidelines without imposing additional or excessive "safety" measures on our Community. Towards the end of 2022 we started to move out of a reactionary frame of mind and into one of stabilization and proactive planning. One major component was a reestablishment of our Finance Advisory Committee. At the conclusion of our twomonth long selection process we named, Dennis Howe (FAC Chair), Joseph Woodward, Mitch Gluck & Luke Moran to our newly established FAC. The four FAC members divided up all the Town Depts between them and started holding meetings with their assigned Dept heads in mid-August. Under the BOS directive, they were asked to spend as much time as needed with each Dept Head to breakdown every single line item in their budgets to move towards a Zero-Based Budgeting model. Each request was to be ranked 1-3, 1 being critical, 2 desired & 3 good to have but not necessary. This model has already yielded great insights into the various Depts & proved to be a powerful tool in creating our 2023 budget. For 2023, the FAC will look to start the budget process with Quarterly Budget Review meetings with the Dept Heads to realize any potential issues & possible ways that the Depts budgets could be more efficient for 2024. Many thanks are in order here, to our Dept Heads, thank you for giving this new process a chance and working diligently with the FAC to develop lean budgets and identifying areas to help improve efficiency and effectiveness of your budgets! To our FAC, thank you for pouring in the hundreds of hours with our Dept Heads and the development of our new Excel based budget building platform!! It is our hope that the new processes developed, and the relationships forged between the BOS, Dept Heads and FAC will help aid in our budget creation for years to come and live beyond the ever-changing Boards, Employees and Committees.

This year after the 2022 March election, we bid farewell to Selectman Hamill as he decided not to run for reelection. Bert will continue to serve our Community in his newly Planning Board appointed role of Engineer to the Planning Board. Thank you for your many years of service to the BOS Bert. True to form, the end for one has brought us a new beginning, we were honored to welcome Lou Alvarez to his first term on the BOS, his careful consideration of the various issues that come before the BOS has proved to be invaluable. Debbie Deaton was promoted to the position of Town Administrator and continues to work tirelessly in her service to our community. Her dedication to excellence and strong desire to get it right has been invaluable to the BOS and our entire Community! Lisa Carbone was named interim Town Clerk Tax/Collector and will be running for her Elected seat come March. With Margie Whitson continuing as her assistant, the TC/TCL office has continued to run smoothly, they make a great team and are doing a great job, thanks Ladies!

Chief Able has proved to be a fearless and competent leader. In under one years' time at the helm, he has recruited and hired 5 new officers. Which by old standards we would call "fully staffed". What that means is that while giving us enough officers to cover our own town 7 days a week, we still do not have 24-hour coverage. With the continued decline of surrounding towns police depts and State police force ranks dwindling to 2/3 their fully staffed size, we now find ourselves in a situation where we are going to have to provide for a couple more officers in order to have 24 hour coverage for our Community as the previous model of relying on mutual aid from the State Police and our surrounding Communities is just not available on a regular basis. With that being said, Mike and his officers will continue to provide the exemplary, maximum coverage possible to our Community. To all of our new Officers, Welcome & thank you for your service to our Community!

In late March early April of 2022, we promoted Debbie Deaton to the position of Town Administrator. Debbie's knowledge and exposure to most of the jobs inside the Town Office have proven to be integral in aiding here transition into her new role. Her open-door policy and reinstitution of biweekly Department Head meetings has improved moral and given her insights into what works, what doesn't work and how things can be addressed.

As a Board, the Selectmen continue to attend to much-needed maintenance of our buildings and facilities. Selectman Somero has headed up our NIPD renovations initiative, they were started in the fall and should be

wrapped up mid-winter!! Thank you to all who participated in the process over the last couple of years to bring this initiative to fruition!! For 2023 we are hoping to make improvements to our Fire Department, replace our Town Pool pump/filtration system & suction inlets as well as some other potential Rec related projects.

With your continued support of the Road Reconstruction Warrant Articles, we will be looking to replace and repair the roads of New Ipswich. We have received the Southwest Region Planning Commission Roads Audit by which our Roads Committee has reviewed and has found to be invaluable. With that audit and Community input, the Roads Committee will be deciding on which roads projects will be addressed in 2023. For 2023 we will be looking to topcoat Collins Rd and will be addressing numerous small connector roads and infrastructure on the South Western side of town. At this time the Roads Committee has put on hold the construction of Collins Road on the Page Hill side & will be reworking the turnaround so that bussing will be available at the end of people's driveways up on Collins Rd.

A notable change with how we compensate our Firefighters. Under recommendation of our Fire Chief, who stated potential noncompliance with State regulation and a system that did not adequately reward the departments most active members, the BOS decided to try out a move from yearly stipends for every member to hourly pay during calls and training that each member attends. This was a six-month experiment that looks to have worked to boost morale and more adequately compensate our Firefighters and was managed in a way that did not blow up their "Salaries" budget line. We will look to continue this model for 2023 and will address any issues that may arise. NIFD has become one of the area's most reliable, well-run, and active Fire Depts. Their continued dedication to excellence is noteworthy and greatly appreciated! To Chief Lund & the entire NIFD Firefighter Membership, Thank you!

There are numerous Board/Committee vacancies, if you have ever been interested in helping to support, shape and impact your community, there's no time like the present! Check out the various Boards and Committees online, contact a Selectman or stop by the Town Office to chat with someone about the opportunities available.

Once again, we would like to express our appreciation and gratitude to all the people who are elected, volunteer, are employed by and serve the Town of New Ipswich. Without the selfless generosity of so many Community members time and resources we would not be able to function as efficiently and enjoy such a low municipal tax rate. As our Community grows, let us ever be mindful to not create and then become dependent on a local government that has excessive rules, regulations and oversight into our homes and how we conduct ourselves on our property. There is a fine line between organized, helpful, and infringing. Get to know your neighbors, become active in our Town government, and Community and please treat one another with understanding and consideration. We are stronger together.

Conservation Commission



If any residents have an interest in protecting their land, please contact the Conservation Commission. We can answer your questions, discuss protection alternatives, offer technical advice, and provide financial assistance to aid you in your land protection objectives.

The purpose of the Conservation Commission is "for proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and… the protection of watershed resources of the said city or town" (RSA 36-A). Our activities are related to this purpose. Below is the Commission report for 2022:

- Another year has passed, and the building permit process still has not improved. Site activities not encompassed by the building permit can take place before a building permit is applied for. It is the opinion of the Commission that these site activities should be a part of the permitting process. The Commission continues to use GIS and related analytics as tools in its constant quest to enhance and strengthen its natural resource protection efforts. GIS is becoming of increasing importance to the Commission. We wish other town officials would recognize the importance of GIS and support its use on a town-wide basis. In January of 2020, at a joint meeting of the Conservation Commission, Planning Board and Board of Assessors, all three entities agreed that improving the accuracy of the tax maps GIS layer should be a top priority of the Board of Selectmen. As of December 2022, there seems to have been no progress on the matter. Every year that goes by will make the town's transition to GIS more difficult and more costly. During this past year, the Commission requested that the Board of Selectmen allocate money to make the GIS Tax Parcel Maps more accurate. Our request was denied. Note: The inaccurate tax maps have no impact on what a taxpayer pays in taxes. However, the poor quality of the maps is a severe handicap to town planning and natural resource protection.
- The Commissioner allocated \$60,000 to fund easements on two (2) parcels of property. The two properties have abundant natural resources and are worthy of protection for current and future citizens.
- Due to the unusual drought this past year, the Commission received numerous reports of landowners refilling their private ponds. The water being used to refill the pond is foreign to the property and could have deleterious effects on both the pond and its inhabitants. Refilling private ponds with water from an offsite source is a violation of state law and may result in heavy fines.
- The Commission monitors conservation lands which it manages. The purpose of monitoring is to ensure the restrictions and rights defined by the conservation easement are not violated.
- This past year, the Commissions maintained trails located on town conservation land. The hiking trails are for the use and enjoyment of the public. They require periodic maintenance. Volunteers to assist in the maintenance are always welcome.
- The Commission continued its ongoing review of Wetland Permits and monitoring of activities adjacent to
 wetlands and surface waters. The Commission has the ongoing responsibility of protecting water resources
 from impact by development, timber harvesting and land clearing. Water resources are important for habitat,
 water storage, flood control, clean drinking water and for quality of life. Water is the town's most important
 natural resource and is at the center of our protection efforts.
- The Commission welcomes new members who are interested in protecting the town's natural resources and can give time to Commission projects. If interested, contact the Town Office.

Our library director, Michelle Vestgard does an amazing job scheduling and offering different groups and clubs to also include all ages. We have a game night for adults as well as a weekly group that meets for crafts. Our Children's Storytime hour continues to thrive, and our Teen Night also saw great success in 2022 also including a game night for them!

Our library will continue to support our community by offering services such as tax help, vaccines and other educational services available. We strive to support and engage with our patrons by having our vegetable garden, participating in Trick or Treat and offering free pictures with Santa at the Holidays. We also embrace the opportunity to work with other groups in our community. 2022 gave us yet another year to support the Annual Children's Fair as well as participate in the Harvest Festival. The trustees of the library went through a few changes this year, we lost a couple members as well as gained new members. We thank and appreciate all that serve as trustees, their help and dedication is an example of getting involved and caring about our community. We took a day to set up a table at the transfer station this year just to say hi and re-connect with old and new patrons! It was a great day and one we plan to continue to do to stay connected. The trustees for 2023-2024 are committed to continue this engagement to serve our library and people of our community.

All at the library want to thank the community for your continued support through our fund-raising events such as the Book Sale and our very popular Small Business Saturday. We can't thank our local retailers, vendors and supporters enough for all their donations to help keep our library funded to offer this community a place to meet and learn. We spent 2022 trying to rebuild the Friends of the Library group and we continue to encourage those out there who are interested in becoming a friend to contact the library to volunteer.

We turn to 2023 with hope and excitement to continue to offer great programming and events. Planning Board

The Planning Board is a 7-member board that meets 1-2 times a month related to planning and land use in town (such as subdivision, lot line adjustments, or business site plan reviews). The members occasionally recommend updates to the zoning ordinances and consider future needs of the town through master planning and capital improvement planning - so town officials and voters can make informed decisions on budgets and timelines for future projects.

While building in town has continued at a modest pace, the majority of the applications submitted to the Planning Board in 2022 included small subdivisions of 2-4 lots, and lot line adjustments between neighbors. One subdivision plan was amended, one lot line adjustment was revoked when the conditions of 2021 approval were not met, and one performance bond was returned as a subdivision was completed. Five gravel pits were inspected, with one exhibiting silt erosion into wetlands (the Planning Board worked with the owner to ensure wetland protection was restored). The Planning Board also assisted the Select Board in understanding and resolving several citizen complaints related to drainage and erosion, as well as trespassing traffic entering a private right of way that was erroneously marked as a road on Google Maps.

This year there were a number of changes in individuals who serve the town in the area of planning. Two board members resigned in their last year of service with alternates serving in their stead. The long time Planning Board consulting engineer retired - the board considered proposals and materials from 5 individuals/groups before selecting a local engineer who is familiar with the town operations. The Planning Board has also been part of a multi-department review of inspection and code enforcement in an effort to determine the best way to meet town needs going forward.

Smaller planning board workgroup activities included continued investigation on the potential use of solar panels on town property, the need for a commercial district and monitoring state initiatives to improve broadband availability across NH. The establishment of a solar panel array has significant potential to lower town costs, but limitations in locations suitable for an array and lack of 3 phase power infrastructure to carry the power are logistical barriers that have slowed consideration. While local realtors note interest in commercial/light industrial spaces which could provide support for development of a commercial district via a warrant article, a lot of businesses have successfully used special exceptions via the ZBA process. There are variable to consider (some with long lasting consequences) resulting in a decision to move forward carefully and to seek additional public input during the upcoming Master Planning process. In the area of broadband, Comcast data estimates 95% of residents in New Ipswich have service - surveys and legislative activity are both being pursued to help those who may need service.

A number of planning activities this year considered yearly and future budgeting, as well as how to sequence and prioritize costs for capital equipment/projects that will impact quality of life and taxes in our community. Site visits and preliminary meetings with heads of larger town departments were started this year to understand town resources and to update project worksheets that will inform future meetings with the Finance Committee starting in 2023.

Since the Master Plan helps guide the work of the Planning Board, results of the existing Master Plan were reviewed this year, including surveys, analysis and goals of the various town boards and committees (updates are recommended every 10 years). The last major revision of the Master plan was 1995, although there were a number of updates between 2004 and 2007, and the transportation and land use sections were updated between 2012 and 2013. Following approval by the Select Board this year, the Planning Board will be pursuing a revision of the Master Plan in 2023. The process provides opportunities for community input through focus groups and surveys that will help reflect the needs and priorities of the community at a high level. Please watch for notices in 2023 to participate in the process that will help guide the work of Boards and Committees moving forward.

A number of land use regulations were adopted by the State over the summer, which went into effect between August and December 2022. The land use clerk and board members participated in a number of learning opportunities related to fee schedule requirements and attempts to streamline application timelines. Several members participated in virtual state planning conferences and webinars on topics such as road regulations, housing needs, planning board procedures, religious uses, and a range of other topics. Other educational activities that occurred during the year included internal training on map reading, reviewing applications and plans, how conservation properties are created, and use of the assessors new CAI mapping system.

The Town Health & Welfare Office presented on homelessness at the local and regional level since some local residents have been seeking services in larger towns instead of their local communities. Southwest Regional Planning Board has been collecting data on housing and working to help communities understand options to address local and regional housing needs in conjunction with the state.

SORLAC (Souhegan River Local Advisory Committee)

Souhegan River Local Advisory Committee (SoRLAC) is pleased to provide this annual report and to announce a successful grant submission to create the 2023 Souhegan River Corridor Management Plan (award expected in 2023). The grant submission to the state's revolving allotment for Water Quality Planning 604(b) fund was a result of a year-long effort by members of SoRLAC.

Our goal was to pursue an updated stream management plan and to identify projects to improve water quality. We sent a survey to several hundred watershed residents and evaluated the needs in the watershed. SoRLAC worked in coordination with the Nashua Regional Planning Commission and NH Department of Environmental Services (NH DES) to complete the grant request.

The corridor management plan will update the 2006 Souhegan River Watershed Management Plan, address risks to the river, human health, and record changes in the river corridor. We also worked with the Souhegan Watershed Association to create a water sampling plan for *Escherichia coli (E. coli)* issues in the watershed. The sampling plan will identify the source organism of *E. coli* with DNA tests. NH DES is assisting our request to the US Environmental Protection Agency to run these analyses in 2023.

This year SoRLAC held 11 regular meetings, 2 working sessions, completed 1 site tour, and reviewed 8 plans of permit applications for projects near or on the Souhegan River. Our team volunteered more than 264 hours. Reviewed projects were varied and included a review of a proposed dog park, pesticide application, building projects and wastewater treatment facility upgrade. Minutes and other details are posted on the Nashua Regional Planning Commission website (https://nashuarpc.org).

The Souhegan River runs 34 miles through multiple towns including New Ipswich, Greenville, Wilton, Milford, Amherst, and Merrimack. The watershed also includes parts of Massachusetts, Temple, Lyndeborough, Greenfield, New Boston, Bedford, Brookline and Mason. The river has a rich history and provides benefits such as wildlife habitat, hydropower, recreation, agricultural and industrial use.

The Souhegan River is a state-designated river. The designation in accordance with RSA 483 means the state along with the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program offers an extra layer of protection for the Souhegan River. The program supports the partnership between the state and local citizens through Local Advisory Committees.

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Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service, Inc.

Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service, Inc. (SVAS) saw some personnel changes in 2022. We lost a few good people due to work and family commitments BUT we gained more employees than we lost. We currently have 21 employees on our roster which consists of 2 Advanced-EMTs, 13 EMTs, and 6 drivers. Two of our EMTs are currently in Paramedic programs which will be of great benefit to our service and the communities we serve in the upcoming years. We are a way out from them being Paramedics but are excited to know that in the future we will be able to provide all levels of EMS care to the residents of New Ipswich and Greenville.

In July, we entered into an agreement with Peterborough Ambulance in which a paramedic will automatically be dispatched to all Delta and Echo level calls. This agreement has proven to be very beneficial in providing quick access to paramedic level care to our very sick and/or injured patients. SVAS works hand-in-hand with the paramedic crew to make decisions on what treatments are best for our patient's needs. Since the start of this agreement on July 15th, there have been 59 calls to which a Peterborough Paramedic has been automatically dispatched. Of these 59 calls, the Paramedic was utilized for ALS level care above SVAS training 22 times.

SVAS entered into an agreement with Specialty Vehicles, Inc. to purchase a new 2022 Ford F-550 LifeLine Superliner Type-1 ambulance. With constant increases in vehicles, we felt that it was time to replace one of our older ambulances that was beginning to have mechanical issues. We were fortunate enough that the company was able to find us a 2022 Chassis and we should be receiving the new ambulance in the spring of 2023. With manufacturer back-orders, we were originally told 18-24 months for the purchase of an ambulance which would have resulted in the vehicle costing an estimated \$25,000 to \$40,000 more than our current purchase price.

Again this year, we are encouraging residents to mark their homes with reflective, easy-to-read house numbers posted visibly on your mailbox. If you do not have a mailbox, these numbers can be posted on a pole at the end of your driveway. Being able to identify your home in the time of an emergency could cause a delay in the ambulance service reaching you during your time of need. There were several incidents over the past year where the ambulance crew had a difficult time locating residences due to poorly marks or unmarked homes.

In 2022, SVAS responded to 604 calls for aid as well as providing stand-by ambulance coverage at fire scenes, police stand-bys, and community events. Calls for assistance are broken down as follows:

The Supervisors maintain the New Ipswich portion of the State of New Hampshire ElectioNet database. Tasks include entering new voters, removing voters who have died or moved out of town, updating existing voter records, and ensuring that our town records reflect accurate voter data. We also coordinate with the State of New Hampshire and officials in other states to track changes of domicile (both into and out of our town/state) and to ensure there are no duplicate voters.

YOUR VOTE MATTERS!

Residents who are not currently registered to vote in New Ipswich may register with the Town Clerk during regular hours, or with the Supervisors at designated times we post at the Town Office, at the New Ipswich Post Office and on the town website – www.townofnewipswich.org. You may also register at the polls on election days. A prospective voter must be a US citizen, be at least 18 years old on the date of the next election, have proof of residency, and show a photo ID.

Town Moderator

This past year, 2022, was one of our busy years we have every other year in NH, albeit still under the cloud of the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2022 we had the Town Meeting consisting of the deliberative meeting in February and the voting session in March, the State Primary in September, and the General election in November. 2023 will be a 'quiet' year as there are only the Town Deliberative Meeting and Election and preparations for a busy year in 2024, starting with New Hampshire's first in the nation Presidential Primary.

There were also other activities taking place.

- Testing of the ballot counting device in preparation for each of the 3 voting sessions and hand counting of the ballots received for each election. These sessions happen 1 week prior to each election and are open to the public. Notices of these sessions are posted at the post office and the town office.
- Work to obtain an electronic check-in system for voters which would allow voters to go
 to the shortest line to check-in, eliminating the current alphabet separation currently
 used.
- Requested in the 2023 budget to replace the ballot counting device with current technology once the State Ballot Commission approves a new machine(s).
- Followed any proposed and implemented changes to NH election laws.
- Attended annual Moderator training provided by the NH Municipal Association.
- Appointed Colin Carroll as a new Assistant Moderator.

Thank you to all the Selectmen, Earl Somero and Colin Carroll, assistant Moderators, Supervisors of the Checklist, poll workers, town workers, the SAU, high school custodians, staff and students, Town Clerk Lisa Carbone, Deb Deaton (the deputy Town Clerk), the New Ipswich Police Department, the Highway Department and all the volunteers who helped during the election process for their support and dedication.

A special thank you to you the public for your good conduct and patience on election days and in obtaining your absentee ballots.

For future reference: The use of the Town Clerk's drop-off box for absentee ballots is **not legal**, completed absentee ballots must be handed in to the Clerk in-person or by someone you have appointed to be your delivery agent (and yes there is a form for such appointments if the person is not a spouse or immediate family member).

If you want to help with the elections, please contact the Town Clerk, Supervisors of the Checklist or myself to indicate how you'd like to support these events and how we can contact you. There are also pre-election day events where the blank ballots are counted and the voting machine is tested which require many hours of volunteer time.

Please remember to bring a current government issued form of identification when you come to vote to show the ballot clerks. If you're new in town and haven't registered to vote, you will be required to bring a piece of mail to demonstrate your residency. You can file your registration to vote with the Town Clerk prior to the final meeting of the Supervisors of the Checklist prior to the election.

As always, the New Hampshire legislature continues to adjust the rules and laws surrounding the election process. At this time, you can still register to vote at the polls in March or file a modified registration (address change/party affiliation change) with the Town Clerk.

Department of Public Works

The Public Works Department repaired cross drainage pipes on Collins Road. We reclaimed and top coated Malthouse Road, Hubbard Pond Road and Stowell Road. The department has been busy grading the gravel roads and putting dust control on them. Debris from past winter build-ups was cleaned up from all the paved roads to help with the drainage.

The Selectmen have identified the following roads in 2023. We will be putting a top coat on Collins Road and reclaim Blueberry Lane, Andrew Drive, Nora Court, Hakala Drive, Philmart Drive, Finn Hill Road and a top coat on Nashua Road. Warrant articles are approved in 2023.

Every year we try to keep up with the potholes and grading of the gravel roads but because of the wet weather that we have seems like we are behind and never get caught up.

As has been for the last number of years we have been having a lot of beaver problems with them clogging up our culvert pipe and at some location flooding the roads. We have been on Boynton Hill Road pulling out the stumps and making the road wider and safer which, if time allows, will keep on going.

We have also been busy replacing street signs from vandalism from being painted and still have more to do when money is allowed. Most of the summer has been working on Collins Road redoing the replacing all the cross culverts. We did a big crack sealing of the roads that were done in the pass.

To accomplish the repairs the money will need to be approved by the voters on an annual basis in March. The Selectmen will continue to meet and update the plan as needed.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and the Town Office staff as well as other departments for all of their support. On behalf of the Highway Department Employees, I want to thank you, the voters, for your support and understanding this year and hope to have a better year in 2023.

Fire Department

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support. As I travel around town, it is clear that community members care about our firefighters and their safety. We had several major fires this spring. While we were able to make what is called a "good stop" in both instances, both of these fires were devastating for the property owners. The outpouring from the community to those impacted reinforced to me the value of living in a small town. While we can never completely eliminate emergencies, I appreciate how we continue to support each other during difficult times.

The Firefighters' Association is currently raising money for new hydraulic tools. These tools are used for cutting and removing vehicles and/or buildings in an emergency in order to gain access to the occupants. The Association has currently raised \$11,000.00 toward the goal of \$30,000.00. The Firefighters Association is a 501c3 organization established to support the Fire Department. Donations can be made online or sent to the New Ipswich Firefighters Association at P.O. Box 324 in New Ipswich.

This past year we began exploring funding sources in order to replace our department radios. Portable and mobile radios are used to communicate both with personnel on the scene and with our dispatch center located in Keene, NH. Our radios were purchased in 2003 and no longer meet the FCC requirements for emergency communications equipment. We applied for an Assistance to Firefighters' Grant (AFG) but recently found out that we were unsuccessful. However, we had a contingency plan and asked the Selectmen to use American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds that had been allocated to the town as a result of the Covid pandemic. With this money we were able to replace all of our mobile and portable radios as well as our base station with an estimated delivery date early in 2023. Based on the fact that our current radios have lasted for 20 years, our communications capabilities are solid for many years to come. However, we want to be proactive so you will see that we are requesting that the town establish a capital reserve account dedicated to communications equipment for the Fire Department. The base price for a portable radio is currently just under \$4,000.00 so we want to make sure that we are prepared when it is time to replace radios again.

Another big change for us this year was the transition from paying our members a biannual stipend to paying them an hourly rate for calls and activities to which they respond. This has enabled us to pay the people who actually respond for the time commitment that they make. While there was a concern that this would increase our payroll budget immensely, we were able to stay within the allotted budget for 2022 and also level fund the payroll budget for 2023. This was because people who rarely respond are no longer getting paid for just being on our roster.

Our roster for 2022 consisted of 31 members (12 certified to the Firefighter II level, 12 certified to the Firefighter I level, two firefighters on military leave, and two junior firefighters). In addition to fire and rescue calls, we have 8 personnel trained as Basic or Advanced EMTs (Emergency Medical Technicians) who can respond to assist the ambulance when requested. Many of our Firefighters also have advanced training in various rescue disciplines such as rope, ice and water rescue. Training for the department at the state level was severely limited again this year but we continue to train on topics that impact our community whenever we can do so safely.

Over the years it has been proven that smoke and carbon monoxide detectors save lives. We ask that you install detectors on every floor of your home and test them twice a year. Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless and tasteless gas known as the "silent killer" that is created by incomplete burning of fuels. Things such as a vehicle running in your garage, an improperly installed wood or pellet stove, a generator running too close to or inside your house and outdoor lighting, heating and cooking equipment being used inside your home during a power outage are just a few examples. Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are designed to warn you of a potential problem. They are relatively inexpensive to install and give you peace of mind knowing that your family is well protected.

We also want to remind you to take a look at your house numbers. Are they visible on both sides of your mailbox or on a post at the end of your driveway? Numbers posted only on the side of your house cannot be seen from the road and are not visible at night. During an emergency, this could cause an unnecessary delay when seconds count. We will be partnering with Souhegan Valley Ambulance in a campaign to increase compliance with the Town's house numbering ordinance and we appreciate your assistance in this campaign. The ordinance can be found on the town website and we encourage you to check it out.

We remain committed to serving the community as we have since 1828 and we look forward to serving you in the coming year.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

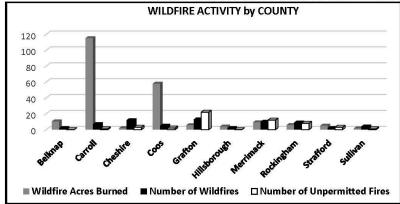
This year was another year where we observed wet weather in early spring followed by rapid drying and drought conditions which extended through the summer for much of the state. Drying conditions in early May led to large fire growth on numerous fires which required multiple days to extinguish and firefighter response from local, state, and federal agencies. Wildfire activity continued through the summer months where dry conditions led to more multi-day fires. Fires burned deep into the ground, requiring firefighters to establish water supplies and to spend days digging out all the hot spots.

This fall we had multiple fires started by the careless disposal of woodstove ashes. Before dumping your woodstove ashes, you should place them in a covered metal container until they are out cold. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The long-lasting drought effects in Rockingham County are showing some minor signs of improvement but a good portion of Rockingham County remains in moderate drought and much of the state is still in the abnormally dry category. While the drought conditions have improved, we expect some areas of the state may still be experiencing abnormally dry or drought conditions this spring. For this reason, we ask everyone to remember Smokey's message about personal responsibility and follow his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"

As we prepare for the 2023 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting www.NHfirepermit.com. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the for Environmental Services. You are encouraged to contact the local fire department for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Thank you for helping us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. Police Department

On behalf of the men and women of the New Ipswich Police Department, welcome to the Town Report. In 2022, the New Ipswich Police Department continued to fill vacant positions and as I write this report we are fully staffed. Over the course of 2022 the agency hired three new staff members, acquired new safety equipment, and made some critical infrastructure upgrades.

In March 2022 we hired Vicente Estrella-Reyes, and he was appointed to work as a full-time police officer. Officer Estrella-Reyes is a full-time certified New Hampshire Police Officer and graduated from the 186th NH Police Academy. Officer Estrella-Reyes is a well-rounded officer, bilingual being fluent in both English and Spanish. He's a true asset to the community and were pleased to have him on board.

In March 2022 Sergeant Wes Vollheim was promoted from Master Patrolman to Sergeant. Sergeant Vollheim has worked tirelessly throughout 2022 training the agency's new officers and building his leaderships skills. Sergeant Vollheim fills many rolls and is a valued asset to the agency.

In June 2022 we hired Jennifer Rheaume, and she was appointed to work as a part-time Animal Control Officer. Jennifer comes to us with 11 years of experience as an ACO. Jennifer has expertise in Animal Control Laws, investigating complaints of vicious, diseased, or stray animals, and handling both domestic and wild animals.

In August 2022 we hired Christopher Peroni, and he was appointed to work as a full-time police officer. Officer Peroni is a lateral hire from New York. He attended and graduated the New York City Police Department Academy in 2015 and worked as a patrol officer for the City of New York. Officer Peroni has experience in patrol, investigations, community policing, traffic enforcement and homeland security. Officer Peroni is in the process of completing the NH Police Academy Law Package to obtain his NH Full-time Police certification.

During the course of the year the New Ipswich Police Department was able acquire new safety equipment. This was made possible by utilizing funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). With these funds the agency was able to purchase and replace our aging two-way radios. The agency procured four new Harris XL-200 portable radios, and four new Kenwood Viking mobile radios. The agency also utilized these funds to upgrade our body armor and active shooter response kits. In total the agency used \$36,675 in ARPA funds with zero tax burden to the citizens of New Ipswich.

In December 2022 Modular Communications Corporation completed an infrastructure update to the agency's main communication tower and two-way radio repeater. This was a critical infrastructure upgrade, as the existing equipment was many years old and was starting to fail. The new tower upgrades and equipment will enhance two-way communication and improve officer safety.

Throughout the year the New Ipswich Police Department and the New Ipswich Board of Selectmen worked for months on a concept for updating and renovating the existing police department building. The existing building had many deficiencies, was unsafe and insufficient in many ways. The new concept gained support by the citizens of New Ipswich and the project was approved. The construction project was awarded to Aho Construction, Inc. and the security contract was awarded to Monadnock Security Systems, Inc.

This project started in December 2022 and will incorporate upgrades to the existing footprint to include reconfiguring some of the rooms to better utilize the space and new flooring installed throughout. As part of this project the New Ipswich Police Department took over additional space that was once rented by Bellows- Nichols Insurance Company. This space will be used to incorporate a new booking area (with jail cells), evidence processing area and an interview and interrogation room. These spaces were not available in the original footprint and gave cause for many safety concerns and was inadequate for our mission.

I would like to offer a special thanks for Matthew Wardwell, as he was instrumental in the concept and CAD drawings for this project. Thanks for your insight. This project was funded by the New Ipswich Police Department Revolving Detail Account and funds encumbered from the 2022 PD Operating Budget surplus. Construction is scheduled to finish in March 2023.

In 2022, members of the Department were involved in 6,561 calls for service, a 55% increase from 4,231 calls for service in 2021. This increase is largely correlated to having more officers on staff and an increase in patrol hours in our community. Below is a list of stats from some of the calls for service the agency responded to.
